

Saint Mary's University International Baccalaureate (IB) Equivalency Chart

Students may receive 6 credit hours of advanced standing for each of the following International Baccalaureate (IB) Higher Level (HL) Certificates, if they achieve grades of 5, 6 or 7.

Spanish	SPAN 1100 (6)

Each of the above courses counts as three credit hours with the exception of LATN 1100 and SPAN 1100 which each count as six credit hours.

Courses are listed in the Saint Mary's University Academic Calendar with the exception of the following electives:

ENGL 1901	unspecified English elective
GEOG 1901, 1902	unspecified Geography electives
HIST 1901, 1902	unspecified History electives
PHIL 1901, 1902	unspecified Philosophy electives
SOCI 1901, 1902	unspecified Sociology electives
SCIE 1901	unspecified Science elective

Credit for IB HL Certificates, not listed above but with a grade of 5, 6 or 7, will be determined on a case-by-case basis.

IB Diploma Credit

Students who have completed the IB Diploma with a total score, including Extended Essay (EE) and Theory of Knowledge (TOK) with a total score of at least 30 points will receive 30 credit hours of advanced standing.

The 30 credit hours will be composed of the credit for Higher Level courses as described above, plus sufficient unspecified electives to total 30 credit hours. The unspecified credit will appear on your record as ELEC 1901, ELEC 1902, etc., with each course equaling three credit hours.

Note: Credit is not awarded on the basis of interim school, predicted or mock results. In addition, students have the choice of refusing credits.
