

Net interprovincial migration of 14,079 for 2021-22 (July to July)


Strong and growing immigration – 11,985 landings from January to November 2022, well above 2021 total landings (9,018)

70% retention rate


Allocation increased by over 40 percent

Immigrant Landings in Nova Scotia


