Welcome to the Lynn Jones African Canadian & Diaspora Heritage Collection!

This is a special collection housed at the University Archives. The Collection documents the lives of Dr. Lynn Jones (C.M.), her family, and over 50 years of African, African Diasporic and African Nova Scotian heritage and history.

How do I access the collection?

The physical material can be accessed by visiting us on the <u>third floor</u> of the Patrick Power Library during our open hours:

How should I handle the physical materials?

The scrapbooks and newspaper clippings in the Lynn Jones collection can be very fragile. We ask that all researchers handle the material with patience and care. To prevent unnecessary damage, we ask that visitors wash their hands before touching the materials and keep all food and drink away from the workstation.

How should I cite the Lynn Jones material?

All references to the collection, or items in the collection, should be:

When citing specific items, you should include the box number, series name, and file name as appropriate. More information on citing archival material is in the library's **Style Guide and Citations page**.

How do I use archival materials for my research?

As with all research, it is good to start with a **research topic** (who and what), and when dealing with historical material, a **date range** (when) and **location** (when) applicable. Our archives staff will be happy to help you with further details!
