## **Background**

Between 2013-14 and 2022-23 (the past ten-years), enrolment of international students has increased by nearly 87%!

- From 11,690 to 21,800 students
- > +160 countries represented on our campuses
- Among the Maritime universities, China has remained the top country of origin over the past ten years
- Most of the gain in recent years is rapid growth of students from India (290 in 2010-2011 to – 3,755 in 2020-21)
- Over the past ten-years, for Memorial University in NL, Bangladesh has supplanted China as the top source country
- In this same period, recruitment of international students has become a high priority for virtually all universities
- Significant expansion of on-campus student services; including building out pathways to employers, settlement groups & communities for those who want to stay, live and work here
- > Aggressive growth targets are being set: in many cases 25% to 30% of total enrolment
- > CBU anomaly: 70% / 70 countries / \$200M economic impact
- For those with historically low #'s less than 5% international student recruitment has taken on a much greater importance
- > Driven by desire to internationalize the campus: academically, socially and culturally
- Growth opportunity in an environment of declining domestic enrolments and stagnant growth in provincial government operating grants

## Factors that make Atlantic Canada an Education Destination

- High quality universities; differentiated opportunities beyond the traditional arts & science, computer science, business, engineering offerings (eg. Francophone, art & design, agriculture, theology, Indigenous, public relations & tourism, healthcare management, entrepreneurism, post baccalaureate business programs)
- Unique graduate programs: oceans sciences, cybersecurity, entrepreneurism to name just a few
- > Safe, secure, welcoming campuses: both urban and rural settings and smaller class sizes
- <u>Competitive undergraduate tuition</u>: among lowest in the country (1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> lowest)
- > Lower than average cost of living than many other study abroad destinations
- > <u>Provincial health coverage</u>: competitive with ROC
- > 12-month waiting period for MSI in NS, NL & NB; only three-month wait in PEI

# Other Important Regional Assets

According to Narrative Research's Atlantic Quarterly (Summer 2021):

- 'Atlantic Canadians place an increasing level of importance on immigration to their province's economy'
  - ✓ 83% believe immigration is critically important or important but not critical
  - ✓ Younger residents (18-34 years), PSE graduates, with \$50K+ incomes, more likely think immigration is important
  - PEI residents are less likely to think that immigration is important to their province
- In short, over the past decade, Atlantic Canadian attitudes about immigration have shifted significantly in a positive way
- Making the region <u>a more welcoming place</u> for international students who are interested in becoming permanent residents

## > Minister Sean Fraser

- ✓ MP from Central Nova and Minister of IRCC
- ✓ Significant federal asset for our region
- ✓ Knows the PSE sector and understands the importance of international students to the sustainability of our universities, regional economy and population strategy

## Immigration Programs Unique to our Region

Close to 70% of international students would like to stay in Atlantic Canada post graduation!

#### Atlantic Immigration Program

- > Helps connect international student grads to employers
- > Pathway to temporary work permit and permanent resident status

#### Study & Stay

- Developed by EduNova
- Invites international students who aspire to stay in NS to apply in their final year of study
- > 10-month program that provides career development opportunities and build community connections
- > Has expanded across the region (e.g. Study & Succeed in NB)

## **Barriers to Attraction & Retention**

Three critical issues confronting successful international student applicants and negatively affecting the reputation of our universities and region:

## 1. Inordinate delays in visa processing

- > Has been brought to the attention of the Minister and IRCC senior officials
  - AAU has created an information form that will help IRCC anticipate visa applicant volumes by country and visa processing office for the three intake periods (January, May and September)

# 2. Dual Intent

- Concerns have been raised about students who express interest that could be perceived as a 'dual intent'. For example, students enrolling in the Study & Stay program are at risk of having their study permit application denied
  - AAU has brought this issue to the attention of the Minister and Deputy Minister as it is at cross-purposes with regional population growth strategies and provincial programs designed to attract and retain international students

## 3. Visa Disapproval Rates

- A FOIPOP request has revealed that international students visa application to our universities have a significantly higher disapproval rate compared to a sample number of universities across the country
  - The AAU has requested IRCC conduct an official review into this matter as it is negatively affecting students, the reputation of universities and region, and university revenues
- 4. Connectivity to the Labour Market
- > Expansion of co-op and experiential learning opportunities
- > Improved access to community networking (e.g. alumni) and employers

## 5. Affordable and Accessible Housing

- Critical issue for all students but particularly for international students who lack the community and social connections of domestic students
- > Lack of understanding of tenant rights and leasing obligations

## 6. Accessible Healthcare

- A critical issue for the general population but particularly international students, particularly first-year students who cannot access provincial healthcare coverage for the first 12 months of their studies
- Note that, not all int'l students are aware of the processes required to access provincial healthcare coverage after the 12-month waiting period or that pre-existing conditions are not covered

#### In summary:

- > Attraction of international students is a growing priority
- We have a lot to offer as an 'education destination': cost competitive, quality, differentiation, safe, secure & welcoming
- > Retention is vital to the success of regional population growth
- > Federal and provincial program pathways to citizenship
- > Working in close partnership with IRCC to address current barriers
- > Accessible, affordable student housing
- > Access to healthcare coverage and services
